



EDGAR FELTON RULON-MILLER

Edgar Felton Rulon-Miller entered on active duty as a First Lieutenant in the Army of the United States, January 13, 1941. He was killed in an automobile accident in Haverford, Pennsylvania, December 28, 1941, the first Alumnus of St. Paul's enrolled in the Armed Forces to die in the Second World War.

Rulon-Miller entered the Third Form in 1926 and graduated in 1930. He was a good scholar and he won his S.P.S. in football, hockey and baseball. The football coaches described him as "one of the best ends the School has had." He was one of the officers of the Athletic Association, and during the first half of his Sixth Form year he was a Supervisor in Foster. At Princeton, where he graduated in 1934, he played in the backfield of the 1933 championship Varsity Football team.

A former member of the First Troop Philadelphia City Cavalry, Rulon-Miller helped recruit the 166th Field Artillery from suburban Philadelphia. At the time of his death he was Commanding Officer of that regiment's Headquarters Battery.
